3. The Context:

It is a common experience that handling of large class rooms with students of diverse social background has become a major academic challenge. The traditional method of chalk and talk has made students passive in the class rooms. The teaching- learning has become too abstract and out of sync with contemporary society. In this method the ability of learner to learn is taken for granted. Hence it has become imperative to adopt new strategies and methodology of teaching. It is high time that learner centric teaching tools are adopted. In this context, the institution has given top priority to participatory learning. It is resulted in meaningful interaction, where students are enabled to accomplish the learning outcomes in the class rooms.

Participatory learning has given identity, self confidence and space for articulation to learners. It has helped the learner to overcome inferiority complex and a sense of loneliness in the class.

Modern digital tools and ICT enabled teaching- learning techniques are predominantly used in the participatory learning class room. Assignments, class room seminars, project based learning, field study and internship training are also supplementing participatory learning. Screening of film and documentaries, the use of theatre compliment class room teaching and make the learning process extremely effective. This method is contemporary and prepares the learner to face global challenges.

4. The practice:

- ✓ Education has become a maker of society for all the time. Gradually, the primary concern of education is classified to skill development such as three Rs [reading, writing and arithmetic]. It is strongly felt in the modern time; education is not merely to inculcate skills among students. It has realized that the main focus of higher education is to transform skills into socio-cultural competence and information based society are transformed into knowledge based society. In this connection, participatory learning is emerged as a symbol of socialization.
- ✓ To facilitate participatory learning "Student Faculty Programme" was initiated, where the MA English students were assigned the task of engaging classes for Undergraduate students.
- ✓ Student Seminars are regularly conducted in the Department of Linguistics and English, where the students are given an opportunity to make presentations
- ✓ The beneficiaries of this practice are rural, socially weaker and vulnerable sections of the society. Participatory learning supports to bridge the gap between socially and economically deprived communities and elites of the society.

Title of the practice: Wall Magazines

Many departments of the institution regularly bring the wall magazines such as 'Hejje Gurutu', 'Dhwani', 'Seva Spandana', 'College Times', 'Sanchalana', 'Jnana sourabha' and 'samajamuki'

(A) Goals:

- \checkmark To provide a platform to exhibit the creativity of students.
- To enable students to review books, film, drama and report writing on contemporary issues.
- ✓ To make students aware of the various fields of expertise like reporting, editing, page making, assignments, project writing and other journalistic aspects.
- (B) The Context:
 - ✓ Wall magazines are of paramount importance to inculcate literary sensibilities, creative expression, rational temper and critical perspectives among students.
 - ✓ Wall magazines supplement learning outcomes and develop a sense of professionalism.
 - \checkmark To overcome the short comings of writing and presentation skills.

- ✓ The publication of wall magazines leads to participatory learning and promote leadership qualities.
- ✓ Wall magazines inculcate the qualities of social responsibility, logical thinking and research aptitude.

(C) The practice:

✓ Wall Magazines are a regular feature of our college. They are produced both in printed and handwritten form. They are brought out in different time schedule. They vary from weekly to fortnightly. The entire process of collection of articles, editing, designing, /writing and distributing is managed by students. The teachers play the role of guides. Though this is a very happy experience, there are many hurdles. The semester scheme and regular internal tests/ examinations come in the way of periodic publication of wall magazines. Financial constraints make students depend upon faculty of respective departments. It is also difficult to sell them in and outside the college. The printing process is also expensive. In spite of this, the students have brought out and produced wall magazines not only periodically but also successfully.

Evidence of success:

- ✓ The publication of wall magazines is a big success. It has been in practice for a long time. Many volumes are brought out in printed form/ hand written form which have shaped the professional career of our students. The leading Kannada news channels and leading news papers have employed our students. The students of the departments of Kannada, English, Journalism, BSW and others are immensely benefited by this practice. Many of them are employed in local news paper and TV channels.
